



Early literacy begins with you and your child. Help your child get ready to read by doing simple activities every day.

<p>10</p> <p>Happy Mother's Day! Go for a walk outside.</p>	<p>11</p> <p>Pretend to be your favorite animal! What sounds will you make? How will you move?</p>	<p>12</p> <p>Use cooked spaghetti noodles to make letters or numbers!</p>	<p>13</p> <p>Opening a clothespin takes a lot of finger strength. Where can you clip a clothespin?</p>	<p>14</p> <p>Draw pictures of animals with your child.</p>	<p>15</p> <p>Read <i>Caps for Sale</i> and see how many hats you can balance on your head!</p>	<p>16</p> <p>Sing "The Grand Old Duke of York" and march around or bounce! (lyrics on back)</p>	
<p>17</p> <p>Make a necklace by stringing beads or buttons on yarn or ribbon.</p>	<p>18</p> <p>Go outside and draw a picture of what you see.</p>	<p>19</p> <p>Sing "The Farmer Plants the Seeds." (lyrics on back)</p>	<p>20</p> <p>When reading, use different voices for the different characters.</p>	<p>21</p> <p>Get the mail together and talk about what was received.</p>	<p>22</p> <p>Sing the alphabet song using a deep voice and then again using a high voice.</p>	<p>23</p> <p>Make up silly rhymes and repeat them with your child.</p>
